The seventh annual Geneva Lakes Burger Throwdown offers the most prolific challenge, and it benefits the ProStart Culinary Program at Badger High School in Lake Geneva.

first two years, but The Ridge has hosted the event ever since. The Ridge, which is located on Highway 50 just west of downtown, sits on the shore of Lake Como.

The beautiful outdoor patio includes a variety of flowers and decorative grasses, a fire feature, a view of the lake and plenty of room for live entertainment while providing a comfortable gathering spot to enjoy the burger tastings.

Grilling up magic

Twelve to 15 grills are arranged adjacent to the patio for the cooking teams to work their magic.

"We are limited by the number of grills we are able to rent or borrow," said Russ Tronsen, principal at Badger High School and the former administrator of the ProStart culinary program.

"The event has been held outside each year except for 2016, when it had to be moved indoors because of inclement weather," said Barbara Karrabas, director of marketing at The Ridge.

Tastings begin at 12:30 p.m. and last until 2:30 p.m. or until all samples have been depleted. Those who bought VIP tickets will receive early admission at 11:30 a.m. There is no limit to the number of samples that one may try. Samples feature full-size hamburgers that are cut into quarters. Each hamburger is enhanced with flavorful items piled on, making them tall and difficult to place in one's mouth. Some tasters are known to try eight or nine samples before giving up.

Consumers Meat Packing, a local

company, donates the burgers.
This allows the competing teams to start with the same high-quality burgers. It is up to the chefs to make their burgers special. Teams bring their own buns, condiments and interesting ingredients to make their burger the best of the best.

Live music adds to the festive atmosphere. Taste the food and relax on the deck. While soda is available for free, eventgoers must pay for alcoholic drinks.

Esteemed judges

This year's burger judges will be Arthur Ircink from Edible Milwaukee, Paul Young of Reinhart Food Service and Eric Rose of River Valley Ranch. They will select the best three burgers, including the trophy winner. And there is no doubt what the trophy is for because it is topped with a hamburger icon.

Last year, the winning team was from Lake Lawn Resort. Will they pull off the feat again this year? What can they prepare that will outdo last year's winning burger? Or perhaps the 2016 winners from the Hunt Club will return to the top? Or maybe it will be another of the excellent cooking teams competing that day.

In addition to the professional judging, attendees may vote for the People's Choice Award.

For Angela Yager, who now teaches the culinary program at Badger and helps coordinate the Burger Throwdown, the event is important.

"The money we receive from the program goes a long way to supporting our work," Yager said. "Last year we received about \$15,000 from the event. That money goes into purchasing equipment and ingredients that allow us to compete. We are fortunate to have so many sponsors who basically cover the expenses of the event. We do pay for some of the minor expenses such as renting the grills."

Students benefit

The Badger crew has been successful in its competitive appearances. It won the Wisconsin State Championship from a field of 23 teams last year, which qualified it for the national championships in Charleston,

S.C., where the Badger squad finished a respectable 12th out of

48 teams.

A lot of work goes into producing a team that is that good.

"We practice three times a week for three months prior to competition," Yager said. "The money to purchase all these ingredients comes from the Throwdown."

The program was started through the Geneva Lakes chapter of the American Culinary Federation and a local meat packing company. Although the local chapter has combined with another group, Tronsen said the work they pioneered here continues.

The ProStart culinary program features a two-year curriculum that ends with an industry certification. Upon completing the coursework, students take an examination to receive a certificate that is endorsed by the National Restaurant Association. "Successful completion provides up to nine college credits when transferring into the restaurant curriculum at Gateway Technical College," Yager said.

Students pitch in

While students benefit from the Throwdown's profits, they also have to work at the event and are involved in many aspects of the project. Some of them will check in ticketed visitors on their tablets. Others will be found near the grills, replacing beef patties so the cooking teams don't run out. The same goes for the paper supplies needed to present samples to the public.

Some of the companies sponsoring this year' event include The Ridge Hotel, Consumers Meat Packing, Reinhart Food Service and Copies and Prints Plus, while Stebnitz Builders also is a contributor.

"We appreciate the community coming together and presenting students with reasons for a brighter future," Yager said. "They are so responsible for the success of our program."

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

Lake Geneva store features clothing and jewelry from Ireland

browser inside Fleming's authentic Irish store in Lake Geneva is readily able to appreciate the owners' close connection to the Emerald Isle.

Kevin Fleming and his wife, Maureen, who have operated Fleming's in Lake Geneva for 40 years, travel to Ireland – from which both sets of Fleming grandparents hail – to buy their merchandise every other year.

Among their authentic Irish merchandise are wool sweaters, tweed hats and caps, sterling silver jewelry and Ireland sports wear.

The store is one of five on Lake Geneva's Main Street that has stayed in business for four decades and has been in its current location for 26 years. Fleming attributes the longevity to the ability to change his merchandise mix with economic times and people's tastes.

"You're always changing," he said.
To that end, and to appeal to summer traffic when wool sweaters and capes are less popular purchases, the store carries a line of clothing that is not from Ireland – a brand from Martha's Vineyard called Vineyard Vines. The clothing features a whale insignia and has "Lake Geneva" written on it. Though Geneva Lake has no whales, Fleming said, the clothing is popular in the summer when the lighterweight cotton clothing comes out.

A LINE TO IRELAND

The store is open seven days a week and stays busy from Memorial Day through

Christmas with an uptick around St. Patrick's Day, Fleming said. Its popular winter items are its Irish sweaters, capes and ponchos. Sterling silver jewelry, children's sweaters and clothing, Belleek china made in Ireland, crystal, pottery and Irish foods are among its wares.

Fleming said the store buys its merchandise mostly from small businesses in Ireland with handmade items such as cutting boards and artwork.

"All the companies we deal with are small, family-owned," he said.

Another pottery line Fleming's carries is Nicholas Mosse pottery handmade in Ireland, Fleming said.

The store sells Guinness clothing and artifacts, Irish rugby wear and other sportswear from Ireland depicting its popular sports – "football" (American soccer) and Gaelic football – a cross between soccer and rugby, Fleming said.

THE STORY OF THE CLADDAGH

Among the jewelry the store carries are cross necklaces and bracelets for First Communion and Claddagh rings. The Claddagh is a symbol that depicts two hands holding a heart with a crown above the heart.

The story of the Claddagh is that an Irish sailor taken prisoner forged the ring for his sweetheart while imprisoned, presented it to her upon his release and said, "With these hands, I give you my heart, and I crown it with my love."

The ring worn with the crown facing out indicates one's heart is available. Wearing the ring with the crown facing toward one's heart means that person's heart is taken.

Fleming's carries Claddagh rings with Connemara marble stones. Connemara marble is referred to as Ireland's gem stone. It is found in the valley of the 12 Bens in Connemara in west Ireland in a range of green tones.

A BIT OF TEA, OF COURSE

The store also sells foods that are common in Ireland such as Barry's Irish tea, oatmeal and chocolates. He said people who have been to Ireland before and recall the local victuals come to the store for the Irish brands.

Much of the store's clientele are local people of Irish descent and natives of Chicago, which has a large Irish population, he said. Its customers know the history, culture and ancestry of Ireland and will find a few pairs of shamrock earrings, but don't expect to find leprechauns and green beer in the store, Fleming said.

When the Lake Geneva natives visit Ireland every other year, they visit their suppliers at their respective factories, see some friends and relatives who still live in Ireland and then "go out at night and relax and have a pint" of beer, Fleming said.

The Geneva Lake Women's Association will host an evening of fun, food and entertainment as its goes back to the 1960s supper club era.


The event will be April 6 at Celebration on Wells, 422 S. Wells St., Lake Geneva.

Horseback riding enthusiasts enjoy myriad options in area

ara LeRoy is biased, but most horse enthusiasts across southeastern Wisconsin agree with

LeRoy was named president of the Southern Kettle Moraine Horse Trail Association on Jan. 13 after two years as the organization's treasurer.

Club members and volunteers are major caretakers in collaboration with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources — of the horseback riding trails and equine facilities in the Southern Unit of the Kettle Moraine State Forest. And they've turned them into jewels among such setups in the Badger State.

'The northern and southern Kettle Moraine trails make up the biggest horse riding system in Wisconsin," said LeRoy, a Jefferson High School graduate who lives between Palmyra and Sullivan. "We also boast one of the best (horse) campgrounds in the state and the only one with showers ... and nobody

gets dirtier than horse people."

That latter statement may be true, and they've got plenty of territory to prove it.

The state park's southern unit features 87 miles of equestrian trails, including 54 miles strictly for horseback riding and 33 more that are shared with snowmobilers.

Enthusiasts can enjoy winding through scenic hardwood forests and pine plantations while viewing oak savanna prairies and myriad beautiful lakes.

The area between Palmyra and Eagle often is the hub, with Horseriders Campground near Palmyra located along the main thoroughfare in an effort that has grown by leaps and bounds since only 5.5 miles of volunteer paths existed in 1967.

"Our facilities are a huge draw," LeRoy said. "We host four three-day endurance rides that pull in participants from five or six states, which is a big deal for us to have people who compete on a national level.

"I lived in Idaho for 10 years and rode in Montana ... it's beautiful country," LeRoy added, "but we have an obstacle course and a lot of little things (such as mounting blocks and hitching posts) that other places don't. Riders are spoiled here, but we're proud of what we have."

A variety of vistas

Trails loop and branch off for riders from Whitewater and La Grange in the southwest to the Ottawa Campground area in the northeast, offering them a variety of terrains to cover and landscapes to marvel at. "Some of my favorite trails are in the Ottawa and Scuppernong areas, I ride the Eagle trails quite a bit and the section between Palmyra and Rushing Waters (off County Highway H)," LeRoy said.

"Riders can see lots of wildlife, including baby deer and turkeys ... it's a unique experience to view them in that environment, where you have a variety of grassy meadows and the oak savannas around Bald Bluff. And there's nothing prettier than the fall colors in Wisconsin."

However, it takes a lot of time and energy from DNR employees and local/area club members and volunteers to make it such a great destination for horse lovers as well as other fans of the outdoors.

Advocates for the trails


The SKMHTA was formed in August 2003 after the fledgling club had been a chapter of the Glacial Drumlin Horse Trail Association, an advocacy group headquartered in Dane County. The SKMHTA's membership roll featured just over 100 households to end 2017, and LeRoy is excited about the future.

"We've provided the labor and raised funds for many special activities and

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facilities, such as the electricity at the campgrounds," LeRoy said. "We've received lots of donations and support from local businesses in Eagle and Palmyra, and not just places related to the horse riding community. Restaurants, gas stations and other businesses have been heavily involved, but at the same time our facilities and events bring them a lot of business. So, it's been all about building strong community relationships."

Other riding options While that tri-county region of

While that tri-county region of Walworth, Jefferson and Waukesha counties provides the largest and arguably the most popular venue(s), it's not the only location in the Southern Lakes area offering options for horseback riders.

Richard Bong State Recreational Area, located about eight miles southeast of Burlington in northwestern Kenosha County, features more than 13 miles of equestrian trails, plus 4.5 miles of horse riding/snowmobile routes.

Beth Goeppinger is a naturalist at the 4,515-acre recreational area, where the horse trails closely follow park boundaries south of Wisconsin Highway 142.

"I've ridden on the trails once, but I've walked them many times," said Goeppinger, who has worked at Bong for nearly 24 years. "They're not super busy, but I know a group of people south of here comes over a lot ... they own homes near an access point."

She said the trails aren't open during the

spring if it's too wet. However, riders take advantage of the trails most other seasons.

"Fall usually is the busiest time," Goeppinger said. "The park offers nice wooded areas and a lot of beautiful prairies. You won't see the hills and things like at the Kettle Moraine, but they're nice trails."

Another, much shorter riding opportunity is available on a two-mile stretch from Springfield to Lyons, a trail that runs adjacent to the White River State Trail, a 19-mile hiking/biking jaunt that travels from Elkhorn to Dover, with a two-mile gap in Burlington.

Numerous stables also offer guided trail rides, including Dan Patch Stables in Lake Geneva and Dream A Horse, Wild 3L Ranch and Kettle Moraine Ranch, all near Eagle.

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Nestled in the southeast corner of Wisconsin, Burlington originally blossomed from agricultural and industrial roots. The first settlers, in the midand late 1830s, were farmers seeking fertile lands and entrepreneurs seeking water power for mills at the junction of the White and Fox Rivers.

A grist mill that supplied flour locally, as well as to Milwaukee, Racine and Kenosha, was the first in Wisconsin to ship flour to New York. A wooden mill made the first roll of cloth turned out in Wisconsin and supplied cloth for Union soldiers' uniforms during the Civil War.

Wheat was the leading farm product through the Civil War days, when livestock and dairying, which had made inroads by 1860, became the major farm industry. Agricultural implement makers and dealers, wagon makers, and blacksmith shops, as well as stores handling groceries, dry goods, clothing, hardware, and other commodities, were established to server the farmers and other residents.

Although Indian mounds and several Indian trails have been noted in the area and a small Potawatomi village existed somewhere in the town of Burlington prior to the 1830s, there was no Indian village in Burlington itself. The Indians, however, hunted in the area and grew some crops in the warmer seasons







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Myers, who has coached Tennell for more than 10 years at Twin Rinks Ice Pavilion in Buffalo Grove, Ill., said the trek to South Korea was worth it.

"Because I have coached Bradie for over 10 years, it was an amazing experience for the both us," said Myers. "I'm glad we could share this journey together."

Rapid progression

Myers recalled the first time she met Tennell, whose spirit showed at the age of 9 and had her often asking questions and seeking ways to improve her routine.

"When I did my first trial lesson with Bradie, I knew she had the spirit and could see she loved skating," Myers said. "Bradie liked being challenged, and enjoyed the process of becoming a better athlete."

The process, however, was arduous after Tennell suffered back injuries, which sidelined her for several months starting in 2015, according to the Chicago Tribune.

Despite the setback, Tennell continued to persevere, and eventually returned to the rink.

"Any athlete at this level has to have fire that burns within," Myers said. "You need the self-discipline. Bradie has both characteristics."

The self-discipline parlayed into a rapid progression. Within just 11 months

she made the leap from junior world level competition to the Olympic stage in South Korea, where she exhibited poise in a highpressure climate.

Olympic bronze

Tennell's performance helped the U.S. Olympic team garner a bronze medal.

"I'm so very proud of the way Bradie handled herself in this high-pressure situation," Myers said.

After the Olympic team won the bronze medal, Tennell presented Myers with an Order of Ikkos award, which symbolizes excellence in coaching.

The Order of Ikkos, according to Myers, offers a chance for athletes to recognize coaches for leadership.

With the Olympic games closed, Myers and Tennell moved on to the World Championships in Milan, Italy, in March.

"We have already worked on some new ideas for the upcoming season, and I know there is much more potential in Bradie to reach even higher levels," said Myers, who looks to join her in the 2022 Olympic games in Beijing, China.

Myers credits Tennell's drive to her upbringing and strong support system.

Tennell, who attends McHenry County College, is the daughter of Jean and sister to two brothers, Austin and Shane, both hockey players.

"Bradie loves to read and is a wonderful role model to the skaters at the Twin Rinks," Myers said.

Journey to Twin Lakes

Before Myers moved to Twin Lakes, she and her husband lived in Winthrop Harbor, Ill., for 18 years, but wanted to return to Wisconsin after their four children left the nest.

"It was the right move for us to come back home to Wisconsin," said Myers, who met her husband at the Kenosha Ice Arena more than 33 years ago.

"My husband and I both knew we needed somewhere to call home that was near the Wisconsin/Illinois border line for our commutes to work," she said.

At the time, she and her husband, who worked for the Zion Park District, decided to venture west of Interstate 94.

That brought them to Twin Lakes, where they have found peace and serenity, in the view of lakes Mary and Elizabeth.

"We love the area. It puts us halfway between Milwaukee and Chicago," she said. "We have room for a garden, and this area brings us so much joy and peace."

"It gives me a calming effect after having a busy day and commute from work," said Myers.



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
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
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
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

Season arrives like Christmas in April

ou know spring has arrived when you're driving through the area and the sight of golfers on the area courses is visible.

Even though the weather may still be cool in early April, it does not keep these dedicated men and women indoors.

For those who have been fortunate to spend some of the winter in warmer climes, such as Florida or Arizona, the wait hasn't been as long to get back on the course. For those who wintered here in the north, these days when the golf courses reopen are like Christmas in April.

All that's needed is a little cooperation from Mother Nature to provide a pleasant spring day for that first round of golf of the season.

So take out those golf clubs, give them a good spring cleaning, hit some practice balls and head out to your favorite golf

course and begin a new season of golf.

The Geneva Lakes area has a wide selection of golf courses from relatively easy courses for the less experienced to high-end tournament-caliber courses that will challenge any golfer.

Here's a closer look at some of the courses in the area:

Hawk's Wiew

7737 Krueger Road - Lake Geneva 262-348-9900

Hawk's View opened in 2001 as a 36hole golf course on land that has had an interesting history. From a farm and storage for ice harvested from Geneva Lake in the 1920s, to Mt Fuji ski hill and a summer concert venue that brought in a variety of popular entertainers in the 1960s, to today becoming one of the premier golf courses in the Lake Geneva area.

The courses were designed by Craig Schreiner, a noted golf course architect from Kansas City. Como Crossing opened in 2001 after 2 years of work. It was followed by Barn Hollow, which made its debut in 2003.

Hawk's View consists of two 18-hole courses to meet the needs of every golfer. The Como Crossing and Barn Hollow courses offer a different golfing experience based on the golfer's ability.

Como Crossing is an 18-hole, par 72, 7,074-yard championship caliber layout that has been chosen as Wisconsin's best in 2015 and Lake Geneva's best in 2015 and 2016. It is a five-star rated golf course.

The most unique feature of the course is the dramatic change in elevation, a result of keeping the contours of the ski hills that laced the property. Hole No. 3 starts at the top of what was a part of the major ski hill and plays downhill all the way. Other holes are also incorporated in the hilly terrain. The course offers pristine playing conditions.

Barn Hollow received its name from the barn on the property that predates the golf

course. Barn Hollow is an 18-hole, par-3, 2,708-yard course that is known as a family-friendly course. It is a perfect course for beginners and families yet everyone from beginners to scratch players will enjoy playing the course.

Majestic Oaks is a championship course and one of the Midwest's premier golf destinations. Located with a scenic view of Delavan Lake on 250 tree-lined acres, it originally opened in 1921 but was re-engineered in 1990 by renowned course architect Dick Nugent, known for his work on Kemper Lakes. The course is known for its stately oaks, and deep sand bunkers. The course provides an exciting golfing experience for all.

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

Area drive-ins offer carhops, traditional food favorites of a bygone era

emember when going out for a hamburger meant heading to your favorite drive-in, one where carhops took the orders and brought food directly to your vehicle?

Drive-ins were family favorites, but they mostly were gathering places for young adults and teenagers — for those with a driver's licenses and an automobile at their disposal — on weekend nights to enjoy a burger, fries and a root beer. At most drive-ins in

Drive-ins also were about socializing with friends. But for many, it was all about showing off of their autos, especially the hot rods popular with young men, many who had customized them to be as loud as possible. And no drive-in was complete without the sounds of rock 'n' roll music reverberating from their car radios.

A&W and Dog n Suds were two popular chains.

Roy Allen founded A&W in 1919 as a walk-up root beer stand in Lodi, Calif. In

1922, he partnered with employee Frank Wright to open the first A&W restaurant in Sacramento, Calif.

They became famous for their root beer served in a frosted mug — at a cost of 5 cents. The chain expanded in 1926 with franchises spread throughout the country.

Dog n Suds was founded in Champaign, Ill., in 1953 by two University of Illinois music teachers. Their specialties were hot dogs and root beer. Their growth was phenomenal, and by the mid-70s the company could claim over 600 restaurants in 38 states and Canada.

Dog n Suds also used carhops — usually teenage girls, who often attracted young men from the area.

While many of these restaurants have closed and been replaced by fast-food places such as McDonald's and Burger King, drive-in style restaurants in the Geneva Lakes area continue to share that old-time spirit.

Here are a few favorites for those looking to enjoy a step back into the time of "Happy Days."

Gus's Drive-9n

It is located at 3131 Main St. in East Troy. When Gus and Jessica Athanasopoulos bought it 16 years ago, the restaurant was an old A&W that had been closed for some time.

"We liked the location and looked forward to bringing back the retro vibes of the restaurant," Jessica Athanasopoulos said. "We kept the flavor of the restaurant by retaining the old-time look."

The restaurant is all about classics. It starts with their décor, which takes one into the 1950s with the black and white tiled floor that carries to and up the wall behind the service counter. Red and white booths and tables fill the room. Walls are bright and multicolored with gasoline signs from Texaco, Union 76 and Mobilgas, along with photos of cars, cars and more cars.

That theme also dominates outside, where classic cars, trucks and motorcycles fill the parking lot Saturday nights. The autos mostly come from Minnesota, Illinois and Wisconsin.

"We usually have 200 to 400 cars here for the car shows," Jessica said.

The classic theme continues with the food. Everything is made to order and fresh; hamburgers are never frozen. Specialty burgers have names such as the Heavy Chevy and the Ford Burger. Be sure to order the one named for your car. Vienna beef dogs are served Chicago style — no ketchup. Italian beef, another favorite, is slow roasted in-house. Friday fish fries feature cod freshly battered.

And, of course, there is frozen custard,

which is made in-house daily using milk from a local farm and 100 percent pure vanilla. This custard makes the best-frozen drinks, whether it's a root beer float or fruit smoothie. Check out the custard flavor of the day.

Annie's Burger Town

Elkhorn also has a classic drive-in at 645 N. Lincoln St., which is housed in a building that has been around for over 50 years. Jeff Halpin has owned Annie's for the past 25 years and said the restaurant was built as a Dog n Suds.

"Root beer has been produced in this

building for the past 50 years and continues to be made here today," he said.

Annie's prides itself on its freshly made foods from scratch.

"We use the highest-grade meats, which are delivered twice a week," Halpin said. "Our onion rings, coleslaw and ranch dressing are made in-house. Our menu contains a wide variety of typical drive-in foods such as the traditional burgers, hot dogs and our root beer floats are made with our own homemade root beer."

"We are able to provide gluten-free and vegetarian meals as needed," he said. "We do our best to provide whatever you need as long as we have the ingredients."

While its menu has grown to include salads, wraps and a variety of other great foods, what do you really want? Annie's

offers good service, hamburgers, hot dogs, the special homemade root beer and that old-time, drive-in vibe.

And when warmer weather arrives, carhops, who serve customers in their vehicles or at the picnic tables. While there is seating indoors, it is limited.


"We keep the building in a time warp to keep the feeling of the early days of driveins when they were the favorite place to go."

Stop by on Friday evenings from 6:30 to 8:30 for the classic car show. It is held each week from Memorial Day through August.


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Observatory to close

Village discussing future of historic facility with university


he University of Chicago recently announced plans to wind down its activities at Yerkes Observatory in Williams Bay over the next six months and to formally cease on-site operations by Oct. 1.

The upcoming summer season will therefore be the final season of University activities at Yerkes, according to the university's announcement.

Officials stated they announced the plans well in advance in order to engage with Yerkes staff and nearby communities, including the Village of Williams Bay, in considering long-term plans for the property.

Despite its important history, the Yerkes facility and its instrumentation no longer contribute directly to the research mission of the University of Chicago, which has made major investments in the Magellan and Giant Magellan telescopes in Chile, the announcement states.

Yerkes has continued to make important contributions through its education and outreach programs, and that work, which remains important to the University, will now relocate to the Hyde Park campus, officials said.



"Science at Yerkes in the 20th century led to key discoveries and advances in the field of astronomy, when the observatory helped build the foundation for modern astrophysics," said Edward (Rocky) Kolb, dean of the Division of the Physical Sciences and a professor in the Department of Astronomy & Astrophysics.

"It is an important part of the history of the University, and we hope it will become, in some form, a valuable resource to the surrounding community and visitors to the Lake Geneva area," Kolb added.

The observatory was established by the University in 1897 and has been the home of groundbreaking work by scientists such as George Ellery Hale, Edwin Hubble and Subrahmanyan Chandrasekhar.

The facility was the home of the University of Chicago's Department of Astronomy and Astrophysics from the time it opened until it began relocating to Hyde Park in the 1960s.

In recent decades, the University's research in observational astronomy has shifted to using facilities located all over the globe and in space.

The University and staff at Yerkes will honor existing commitments for events at the facility scheduled before Oct. 1, and will accept new bookings on a case-by-case basis.

"Unfortunately, operating Yerkes no longer makes sense for the University from a programmatic or cost standpoint. Drawing to a close our operations there is the first step in a collaborative process to determine the ultimate disposition of the buildings and property," said David Fithian, executive vice president of the University. "We currently have no specific plans nor have we approached any potential buyers," Fithian said.

Derek Douglas, vice president for civic engagement and external affairs, was expected to represent the University in discussing options with the leadership of Williams Bay and its residents beginning in March, the announcement states.


