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

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SOUTHERN LAKES NEWSPAPERS

t all began in 1874 in the Town of Geneva in southern Wisconsin. A race was held to honor a visiting Civil War Army officer, Lt. Gen. Philip H. Sheridan.

Sheridan was stationed in Chicago as the commander of the Department of the Missouri, but was also known for his coordination of military relief efforts during the Great Chicago Fire on Oct. 8, 1871.

This yacht race to honor Sheridan was held on Aug. 31, 1874, with a fleet of seven boats of various lengths participating. These boats were known as "sandbaggers" so called because of the bags of sand placed in the boat for ballast.


Organizers raised \$200 for an appropriate trophy, although the actual trophy was not completed for more than a year. The trophy, which was named the Sheridan Prize, was designed and produced by the Chicago Firm of Giles, Brother and Company.


The prize would have a silver replica of the winning boat on the top. This expensive trophy – \$200 was worth a great deal in 1874 – would continue to be awarded each year and continues to be the prize for the Sheridan Race still held each summer.

Whoa, Nettie!

The race, which covered about 16 miles, was observed by Sheridan from the judges' boat. The 21-foot, topsail sloop "Nettie" sailed by Billy Woods and owned by Julian Sidney Rumsey won the race. Rumsey, a Chicagoan who enjoyed summertime on Geneva Lake, was a successful grain merchant, past mayor of Chicago, and former president of the Chicago Board of Trade.

It was almost two years later, on April 29, 1876, that a group of boat owners gathered at the Whiting





House, a popular hotel for vacationing visitors, and established a yacht club.

Initially known as the Geneva Lake Yacht Club, this group of sailing enthusiasts recognized the year 1874 as the date of the first Sheridan

Prize Race and also backdated the official date of forming the club to 1874. They chose Chicago industrialist Nathaniel Kellogg Fairbank as their first commodore.

By May of 1876, 56 members had been elected to join including Sheridan, who would present the trophy to the winner of that year's Sheridan Race – the first officially under the auspices of the Geneva Lake Yacht Club.

The yacht club reorganized in 1891, registered under a new name, the Lake Geneva Yacht Club, and in the early 1900s

merged with the West End Yacht Club of Fontana.

Finding a home

It was time to find a home for the club. Their first official club house was at Cedar Point on land leased from the first Commodore's son, Kellogg Fairbank for \$500 a year. Money was raised by the membership subscribing to a building fund, for the construction of the first clubhouse to be built on the leased land.

The clubhouse was finished in 1906. It was described in that year's yearbook as follows: "The new two-story clubhouse, set on the lakefront in wooded surroundings, featured generous verandas, and some sleeping accommodations."

It was to remain the club's home until 1916 when Fairbank did not renew the yacht club's lease on the property. The club then became homeless for the next 10 years but continued to



run races from members' piers.

In 1926 the club identified property in Linn Township for its next home and formed a holding company to raise capital to purchase and improve the 1878 residence on the land. Many changes in the club's structure were made, including the formation of the Geneva Lake Boat Repair and Storage Company, which would make its home on the west side of the property.

Sailing school founded

One way to assure the next generation is as interested and competent in sailing as the current one, is to teach them proper sailing techniques and safety. In 1938 The Lake Geneva Yacht Club opened the Lake Geneva Yacht Club Sailing School. In just one year, 40 students were registered in the sailing school, requiring the purchase of additional boats for the program. Boats were also received as gifts from club members.

After a variety of changes in ownership over the ensuing years – including the separation of the sailing school – the two entities finally came together in one space. The Lake Geneva Yacht Club and the Geneva Lake Sailing School built what would become a shared facility.

Officially dedicated in July 2015, the new, two-story building with 12,000 square feet of space allowed the sailing school to operate on the first floor of the building and the yacht club on the second floor.

The entire property consists of approximately 8 acres. The property is designated as the Buddy Melges Sailing Center.

Beasts of ballast

In the early days of sailing on Geneva Lake, the boats were mostly broad beamed open, shallow-draft sloops that had evolved

from workboats. Most of these boats carried the 50-pound sandbags for ballast that the crew, usually of 10 or more, shifted as needed. Rules for the moveable ballast and the crew as stated in an early Lake Geneva Yacht Club yearbook were:

"After the starting signal is given no throwing out, taking in, or booming out of ballast will be allowed and each yacht must bring back the same persons with which it started."

Over the years the sailboats changed. Today the boats are usually built of fiberglass and the mast of aluminum making the boat much faster. The sails are also lighter. No longer made of heavy cotton, today's sails are

often made of Dacron.

Wisconsin boat builder, and yacht club member, the late Harry C. Melges Sr., built his first C-scow in 1945 and since that time his family, which remains prominent in sailing circles, has continued to manufacture boats in Zenda.

The yacht club holds a variety of races for different classes of the sailboats. They include the 38-foot A class, the 28-foot E Class and the 20-foot C class sailboats. Newer styled sailboats, including the Melges 24, 17 and 14, also have races and regattas specific to them.

The full summer racing season will include not only local races, but also a variety of national championships and invitational regattas in various classes. This variety of races will attract sailors from other areas as well as those who are local sailors. On the last Saturday of August the Sheridan race will be held. The race now is

limited to boats in the A class.

The rise of Buddy

Anyone involved in the world of sailing is familiar with the name Harry C. Buddy" Melges Jr. Melges who began his sailing career as a student in the Sailing School, won a variety of major sailing championships, including three U.S. Men's Sailing Championships, and was named U.S. Yachtsman of the Year in 1961, 1972, and 1978 and won a variety of other awards.

Melges was also known for his International awards. With fellow Lake Geneva Yacht Club member Bill Bentsen, he won a bronze medal at the 1964 Olympic Games. Melges returned to win a gold medal in the 1972 Olympics. His many international awards, including an America's Cup victory in 1992, led to him being inducted into both the America's Cup

Hall of Fame and the National Sailing Hall of Fame. In 2015 he was inducted into the World Sailing Hall of Fame by the International Sailing Federation.

There are a large number of sailors both from the Lake Geneva Yacht Club and the Sailing School who continue to win races locally, nationally, and internationally. While many of the sailors make their name known on the water, others such as the Lake Geneva Yacht Club's Bill Bentsen and Bob Pegel have been honored not only for their sailing but also

for their contributions as racing judges. Bentsen was inducted into the National Sailing Hall of Fame in 2017 for his contributions in the development of the racing rules.

Notable women

While many think of sailing as a man's sport, there are many women who excel at sailing. One such woman was Lake Geneva Yacht Club member Jane Wiswell Pegel, who, like Melges, began her racing career in youth races in the 1940s.

Her boat was named "Calamity Jane." She continued to be successful at both the local and national level, being awarded a variety of titles including U.S. Yachtswoman of the Year on three separate occasions – 1964, 1971, and 1972.

Over the years, the yacht club has continued to grow in membership and on most evenings throughout the summer races are held on the lake. The sailing school also has continued to grow and

this year more than 350 children along with a number of adults learn the art of sailing from some of the best and most experienced sailors in the area.

What became of Nettie?

Do you wonder whatever happened to the Nettie, the sloop that won the original Sheridan race? In 1892 Julian M. Rumsey, son of the original owner, realizing that the Nettie was no longer competitive, loaded her with rocks and towed her out to deep water. There he bored holes in her hull and allowed her to sink.

On the 65th anniversary of the original Sheridan Race, in the year 1939, following the completion of the competition, the judges' boat and its trailing gallery headed to the spot of Nettie's grave and paused at the site while the winning skipper cast a wreath upon the water in the Nettie's memory.

With the Nettie resting at the bottom of Geneva Lake, the boats of the Lake

Geneva Yacht Club – with their white sails flying – can be seen racing across the glistening water as new generations of sailors carry on the sailing tradition.

Ribfest beefs up the music for its July 12-15 run

Though it began as something organizers hoped would grow into an annual event, Elkhorn Ribfest, a national rib competition now entering its third year, has expanded into a smokin' sweet festival that attracts thousands of people.

This year Ribfest will span four days, kicking off on Thursday, July 12 and going through Sunday, July 15.

The reason for that growth is simple, according to one of the organizers.

"Everyone loves barbecue," said Larry Gaffey, who also manages the Walworth County Fairgrounds, where Ribfest is held.

The friendliness of the rib-cooking pros is also a draw for many people.

"One of the great things about Ribfest is that you can ask the pitmasters face-to-face. Most won't divulge their most secret of secrets... but you'll be surprised at how open and approachable the cooks are," a blog on the event website states. "Most home grillers are tempted to try a different rub, sauce and wood combo for cooking each meat. The pros don't. They find one flavor profile that works with all the meats they cook."

Options abound

By bringing in numerous pitmasters, there are plenty of options for attendees to try, including ribs, chicken, brisket and pulled pork, along with a variety of side dishes. There is also a beer tent, which will be larger this year than in past years.

Ribfest will again feature a competition among top ribcookers from all throughout the country, including a few locals, and visitors have the chance to taste-test all the delicious smoked items.

In addition to the professional pitmasters, there is a



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community division on Sunday, July 15 with the cooking starting at 11 a.m., with judging from 5 to 6 p.m. and the award presentation to follow.

The community division features up to 25 teams of amateurs, each consisting of a chief cook and up to three assistants. They must prepare and cook all of the food in their designated area and must cook at least one rack of ribs. A team of four judges will score in the areas of appearance, taste, and tenderness and texture.

Prizes for the community division are \$150 and a trophy for first place, \$75 for second place, and \$35 for third place. For complete rules visit the website, wisconsinribfest.com, click on "vendors" followed by "community division."

The event is suitable for the whole family with a carnival and other activities, including helicopter rides.

Music lineup expanded

One of the main attractions at Ribfest is the live music, which was expanded over all three days of last year's event, a trend that will continue this year. Twenty bands are set to perform over the span of all four days, offering as much variety as the food that will be available for purchase.

On July 12, featured bands will include Bella Cain, Back in Black, Chasin' Mason, Acoustic and Jason Kent's Blues Trip. Friday will feature Cherry Pie, Saving Savannah, Hobie & The Leftovers, The Amazing Farm Boys, Wise Jennings and The Throwbacks.

On Saturday, July 14, Arch Allies, Hillbilly Rockstarz, Kashmir, the Eddie Butts Band, The House of Music and There Goes The Neighborhood will provide entertainment.

The final day of Ribfest, Sunday, July 15, will feature Walworth County Idol, the Triple D Band and Rockstar Rodeo.

For the motorcycle enthusiasts out there, a new addition will be the Ribfest



Rib Run, a special invite for bikers to the Thursday night festivities in which they'll receive food discounts and special parking, and prizes will be awarded in a variety of categories.

And if food, the carnival, kids activities and live music aren't enough to satisfy your taste buds, the event will also boast a juried fine arts and crafts exhibition called Artisan Vendor Alley that will feature handmade items.

Popularity grows

Social media, one of the keys to the event's success according to Gaffey, is again seeing a positive response.

As of mid-June, nearly a month prior to the July 12 kickoff, the event post for this year's Ribfest on Facebook shows 47,000plus people are interested in attending.

Gaffey said the event has evolved because it caters to what people enjoy, from

good food to a family-friendly atmosphere, to live entertainment.

"As Wisconsinites, we all love festivals," Gaffey said.

There is no admission fee or charge to park at Ribfest. Because of limited seating however, people are encouraged to bring their own lawn chairs.

Ribfest returns to the Walworth County Fairgrounds, 411 E. Court Street, Elkhorn, from July 12 to 15. The hours are 3 to 10 p.m., Thursday, 11 a.m. to 11 p.m., Friday and Saturday, and 11 a.m. to 7 p.m., Sunday.

The event benefits the fairgrounds, the Elkhorn Area Chamber of Commerce and Tourism, and the Elkhorn Rotary Club. Major sponsors are Coors Light, Frank's Piggly Wiggly, Kunes Country Auto Group and Miller Brewing.

aterford's eighth annual Balloonfest lifts off July 19 and flies until July 22 on the Evergreen Elementary School grounds at 817 W. Main St.

The Waterford Area Chamber of Commerce festival is presented by Triple Crown Products, Waterford, and features live music, kids activities and entertainment, arts and crafts market, beer garden, helicopter rides, tethered balloon rides, laser light show, sky diving demonstrations, pancake breakfast on Saturday, outdoor movie night, night balloon glows and food vendors.

Admission to Balloonfest is free. On stage at Balloonfest this year will be the Lunch Money Bullies at 7 p.m. on Friday and Chasin' Mason at 7 p.m. on Saturday. Both bands will perform on the

The eighth annual Waterford Balloonfest will run from July 19 to 22 on the Evergreen Elementary School grounds at 817 W. Main St. The free festival, presented by Triple Crown Products in Waterford, features hot air balloon activities (including competitions, launches

and night glows), food, craft and business vendors, a beer garden, live entertainment stages for kids and adults, helicopter rides, tethered balloon rides, an outdoor movie, kids activities and more.

Barnes Road Beer Garden Entertainment Stage.

The festival has added a few new events to the lineup.

"We have Milwaukee Rotocross Racing coming to race drones," Waterford Area Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Angie Sterling said. "It's an up-and-coming sport and we'll have 24 pilots coming in for that."

Also new this year, the festival will feature a national balloon competition.

Balloon championship joins festival

In February, the chamber WindDancer Balloon Promotions and the Balloon Federation of America announced the 2018 U.S. Women's National Balloon Championships will be held in conjunction with Balloonfest.

According to the chamber, the Balloon Federation of America's Hot Air Balloon Competition Division voted unanimously to award the championship to Waterford.

"Waterford was lucky enough to win the bid to host the women's national pilots' competition and we have 14 female pilots coming in to compete Thursday and Friday," Sterling said. "Waterford is the only place it's happening in the United States. It's a big race."

Sterling said a total of 29 hot air balloons will be at the festival this year.

"That's double what we usually have because of the race," she said.

The effort to obtain the championship was led by Ken Walter, owner of Wind Dancer Balloon Promotions, who serves the organization as the overall Balloonfest event director. Walter said factors such as organizational strength, flying area,

community support, proximity to major population areas, time of year and volunteer base are all considered in awarding the event.

The U.S. Women's National Championship will run July 18 to 22. Balloonfest will add additional hot air balloons to the mix beginning on Friday, July 20, and running through the weekend.

The annual festival attracts about 20,000 visitors each year, but Sterling said with the national competition, organizers were hoping to see 25,000 to 30,000 attendees.

"We're keeping our fingers crossed for beautiful weather and great competition," Sterling said. 1 to 3 p.m. – Hot Air Balloon Pilot Meet and Greet



Historic hideaway

The French Country Inn has rich stories to tell

Known today as the French Country Inn, the boutique hotel along the shores of Lake Como has a long and interesting history, including a connection to the 1893 World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago, a celebration of the 400-year anniversary of the voyage of Christopher Columbus to the Americas.

Owner Tony Navilio said the property

began as an ice-storage house. In the late 1800s and early 1900s, ice was harvested throughout the winter from the clear lakes of southern Wisconsin and transported by rail to Chicago to be used during the summer to keep food refrigerated. The ice from southern Wisconsin was especially sought because of its purity and could be used in beverages as ice cubes.

The property did not remain an icehouse for long. Early owners, including C.N.

Smith, turned it first into a private club for hunters and later a more open hunting and fishing resort under the name Como Fishing, Hunting and Family Resort. With its prime location on the shores of Como Lake, where both fish and wild life were plentiful, it was an outdoorsman's paradise.

The presence of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway adjacent to the property made transportation to the Como Fishing, Hunting and Family Resort





convenient. The train stopped in Williams Bay and Como Station. According to an early postcard, Lake Como was said to be 76 miles from Chicago by train.

Another early owner of the property was the Notter family. Photographs of the resort, renamed the Lake Como Hotel, taken around 1920 list D.J. Notter as the manager. The Notters did not hold onto the property for long. In 1921 the property transferred ownership when it was purchased by Christian Hermansen. It is here that the interesting history of the property begins.

Treasures from the White City

The 1893 World's Columbian Exposition, in Chicago, was known as the White City for its many white buildings constructed for the event. Most of these were not meant to be permanent buildings but would be taken down after the exposition ended.

Many of the pavilions at the expo were sent from other countries and were often of fine quality, showing off their country's quality work and craftsmanship. Denmark was one such country, with a beautifully constructed pavilion of hardwood featuring an intricately carved wooden stairway and hardwood floor.

The pavilion was built in Denmark, then dismantled and shipped by boat to the United States, ending in Chicago most likely through the Great Lakes. Once in Chicago it was reconstructed at the fair site.


Christian Hermansen, who would become the owner of the Lake Como Hotel, worked at the exhibition using his carpentry skills to rebuild the structures coming in from around the world. It is said that he likely worked on the Danish pavilion.

Hermansen later purchased the Danish pavilion, dismantled it and transported it to the Lake Como Hotel by railroad. Several other items from the 1893 World's Exposition also made their way to the Lake Geneva area.

The Singhalese Temple was brought to the shores of Geneva Lake, rebuilt and was the center of the Chandler Estate, later becoming the Maytag Estate. The Norwegian Stave Church was also brought to Lake Geneva and was used as a playhouse until it was sent to Little Norway as a tourist attraction.

Finally the largest object from the exhibition, the largest refractor telescope









ever built, was purchased by the University of Chicago and housed in the specially built Yerkes Observatory in Williams Bay.

The Senghalese building was destroyed in a controlled burn in 1958, the Norway Stave Church was returned to Norway in 2015, and the Yerkes Observatory is scheduled to shut down this fall. This will leave the Danish pavilion, still intact as the reception building of the French Country Inn as the only reminder of the 1893 World's Columbian exhibition.

Hermansen had three sons, Hobart, Inar and Harry who worked with him at the hotel. Hobart ran the hotel for many years. According to the book, "Murder at the French Country Inn," the Hermansens continued to run their resorts for 50 years through three generations. In the 1930s Hermansen purchased a hotel in downtown Lake Geneva, the Lake Geneva Hotel. It was best known for its architect, Frank Lloyd Wright. Unfortunately the beautiful architectural structure has since been destroyed.

The Lake Como Hotel was tucked away at the shores of Lake Como. To reach it, a narrow road made its way down to the shore with heavy vegetation and trees on either side. The hotel, tucked away at the end of a road that was difficult to find and often missed by visitors, was the perfect spot for a romantic getaway or to hide from the law.

Living the gangster life

While many hotels in northern Illinois and in Wisconsin speak of having Chicago

gangsters hiding out in the area, this was a frequent hideout or getaway for some of the most notorious of the Chicago gangsters.

Secluded and private, gangster George "Bugs" Moran and his wife, Lucille, enjoyed the beauty of the southern Wisconsin area and often visited.

The Morans found the Lake Como Hotel and met Hobart Hermansen, owner, who became a good friend and welcomed them to enjoy time at the hotel. It soon became a favorite place for the Moran family, Bugs, Lucille and her son from a previous marriage, John, to visit.

Bugs Moran was the leader of Chicago's North Side gang while Al Capone was leader of the South Side gang. After years of trying to murder each other's gang members, Capone attempted to murder

Bugs Moran. The St. Valentine's Day Massacre in Chicago occurred when Capone killed seven members of the Moran gang but missed Moran, who was late for the meeting with his gang.

After that, life became difficult for Bugs Moran, who had to remain in hiding, moving from place to place, until he was no longer a concern to the gangs. With his power and money gone, Bugs Moran became involved in counterfeiting, rum running, union racketeering and bank robbery, which eventually ended in his incarceration.

Bugs Moran died of lung cancer on Feb. 25, 1957, in Leavenworth Prison in Kansas. He had only served a few months of his 10-year sentence.

Lucille Moran and her son, John, took refuge at the Lake Como Hotel, her favorite place and divorced Bugs Moran in 1930. She helped Hobart run the hotel. Not surprising, Lucille married Hobart in 1932, but surprisingly Hobart, Bugs and Lucille remained friends.

Here come the Feds

During the "gangster" years, Navilio said there were slot machines, high stakes poker games and free flowing liquor on site at the hotel. On one occasion Hermansen, after he heard federal agents were coming to raid the hotel, dumped all the slot machines off of his 100-foot pier into the lake.


Other gangsters used The Lake Como Hotel as their hiding place. Among these were "Baby Face" Nelson, Tommy Carroll, and John Paul Chase. Nelson was listed as Public Enemy No. 1 by FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover after the death of John Dillinger. Nelson along with his friend, smuggler and bootlegger John Paul Chase,

used the Lake Como Hotel as a place to get away and hide from authorities.

Planning to spend a winter at the Lake Como Hotel with his wife, Helen Gillis, and John Paul Chase, Nelson's plans were disrupted when Chase's girlfriend, Sally Bachman, described the hideout to the federal authorities, saying it was along the lakefront. However she did not share the name of the resort claiming not to know it.

Unfortunately for the group, the federal agent recognized the location of the resort and sent Special Agent Charles Winstead, along with two other agents, to the hotel to await their arrival. However at the time of Nelson's arrival only two of the agents were at the resort because one had taken their automobile to pick up food.

Nelson recognized the trap as he drove up and left the resort with the sound of gunfire from the agents. The agents were unable to follow because they were without their automobile. While Winstead missed his opportunity to apprehend Nelson, Nelson did not get off free. He was shot in Barrington, Ill., by other agents and later died of those wounds in Chicago. Baby Face Nelson was 25 years old.

These are but a few of the stories of Chicago gangsters who enjoyed the Lake Como Hotel in the early years of the 20th century; there are many more – too many to be included here.

Under new ownership

The hotel continued to be run by the Hermansens until 1971 when it was sold to Fay and Gene Leichtey who changed the name to the Red Chimney Inn. After several years they sold the property to Sam Argento who reverted back to the name The Lake Como Hotel. After several years the business closed.

The Navilio family purchased the property in 1986 and rebranded it as The French Country Inn. Much work went into remodeling and repairing the hotel. A restaurant, Kirschs, was opened in the building with a view of the lake. The restaurant was a popular spot until it closed a few years ago.

The Copper Lounge bar remains open and takes visitors back into the days when gangsters mixed with weekend visitors to the area. The alcove with leather furniture across from the bar is a place to look back in time when Bugs Moran, Baby Face Nelson and members of the John Dillinger gang could be found on the grounds. Guests can relive their exploits from the newspaper accounts hanging on the wall.

While the hotel rooms were remodeled to make it a more elegant boutique inn, one thing that was not touched was the oak staircase and the exotic wood inlay floor, the highlight of the hotel lobby, and

a reminder of the distant past when these were a part of the 1893 World Columbian Exposition in Chicago.

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Flat Iron Tap offers locally sourced gourmet burgers and beers

he journey to becoming a farm-to-table, scratch kitchen restaurant was a long one, but in mid-April the doors to Flat Iron Tap in Lake Geneva opened and a dream for owners Dana Trilla and Dave Wingate was realized.


They used their vision to transform the longtime pizza house into what now features clean lines and an artistic look. "We worked on the building for over a year before being ready to open," Wingate said, explaining that they created the unique décor.

It could be described as an ideal combination – Wingate's carpentry and building skills and Trilla's restaurant experience – resulting in just what they set out to do.

"I had worked in the restaurant business in a variety of jobs for the past 25 years, the last five working with my father at Barrique Wine

and Brew Bar on the Geneva Lake waterfront and was ready to open a new restaurant and bar with a very different concept," Trilla said. Wingate had also worked in the

Wingate had also worked in the restaurant business, particularly in the construction and design end of it.

They also shared the same vision – that of owning a place known for serving high quality, fresh food and locally brewed beer.

After gutting the space, the first task was to install a new bar Wingate made from hardwood. He then moved on to the tables, each a different work of art. In addition to tables of traditional height, he built some high-top tables that have become increasingly popular.

The tabletops are also unique and different from each other. They were designed using whatever types of wood, steel, copper, chains or other metals struck his fancy upon entering the workshop each day during the table-building phase, Wingate said.

One of the original items in the restaurant, the tin ceiling, has been restored and is now featured throughout.

"I was able to find some of the original tin tiles tucked behind the ceiling tiles when I was removing them for cleaning," Wingate said, adding he used them in an area that didn't have tiles in place.

The highlight in Flat Iron
Tap, not surprisingly, is the 24
taps offering a variety of beer
predominately from local breweries.
In addition, there are numerous
bottled and canned varieties
available.

"We have over 100 different beers available and 50 percent of them are from Wisconsin breweries. We like to support the local businesses," Trilla said.

The beer tapper itself is a work of art.

"It was created out of an old tractor front end and the tractor's manifold," Wingate explained.

For those not sure which beer they would like or are the type of person who likes to try a variety, the beer flights available are a fitting choice. For \$12, four smaller servings of beer are provided.

In addition to beer, there are also fine wines available from a variety of vintners. The wines include some California varieties as well as wines imported from Chile, Portugal and France. Trilla is the wine expert and said offering high quality wine is a priority.

While having 24 beers on tap is certainly a draw to the beer drinkers it's the food quality that will not only bring customers in but keep them returning on a regular basis.

"We spent a lot of time coming up with the concept for the restaurant and bar," Trilla said. They were looking to present a menu that reflects their values of fresh food. Nothing is frozen or premade as everything is made in-house from scratch using only fresh ingredients that, whenever possible, are locally produced. They chose top quality meat, egg, cheese and vegetable producers in the area and are so proud of the quality of their foods that the farms they purchase from are

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listed on the wall.

"By using quality boutique farms we are able to get fresh foods regularly. They will come and deliver when needed even several times a week. So you can be sure that everything is fresh," Wingate said. "We do not ever use anything frozen in preparing our foods. You can be certain that every dish is made from scratch when you order."

"Our French fries are hand cut. The battered onion rings are thickly cut in our prep area and hand battered to order,' Trilla added.

While the kitchen is visible from in the restaurant it is very small and might make guests wonder where the fresh food is stored, and how everything is done in such a small space. The answer is simple.

On the lower level there is a large prep kitchen and two walk-in coolers to keep everything fresh," Trilla explained.

COURMET BURGERS

Because there are many places in the area to get a burger, they wanted to offer something different and not be "just

another hamburger joint."

Their gourmet burgers are the highlight of the menu, but they also offer numerous presentation combinations.

Along the lines of more traditional but of the highest quality, is the grassfed beef burger. It can be customized with heirloom tomatoes, broccoli slaw, avocado, Portobello mushrooms, bacon, or even a fried egg to top it off.

Of the gourmet variety, the first listed on the menu is the Roosevelt Burger, perhaps so named because of Roosevelt's founding of the National Parks where many Bison roam. It's made from fresh ground bison and topped with thick-cut Flat Iron bacon, cheddar cheese, onion strings, and house Carolina BBQ sauce served on a pretzel bun with fresh cut fries

And there's the Old Mutton, made from Pinn Oak Farms ground lamb. dressed with pickled onion, organic arugula and fresh mint aioli on a toasted pretzel bun.

For those not in the mood for a burger, even of the gourmet variety, Flat Iron offers a variety of sandwiches and salads. The Flat Iron Steak Sandwich

is just one example. It features grilled, marinated skirt steak with caramelized onions and homemade romesco on a toasted ciabatta bun.


Looking to stop in for a beer and appetizer? There are several on the menu, the most popular being the smoked chicken wings that are prepared by braising then smoking in-house and finally, flash-fried.

"We smoke both the chicken wings and our tasty pulled pork in house," Trilla said.

Flat Iron Tap is also family-friendly and the children's menu features grass fed beef burgers, all natural hot dogs, chicken fingers, grilled cheese, grilled chicken breast and house salads. The kids' meals are served with French fries and a beverage.

LATE-NIGHT SHACKS

For people seeking a late-night snack, Flat Iron Tap has a special menu on Friday and Saturday nights with choices available between 9 and 11 p.m. It includes some of the popular appetizer menu including the smoked wings,



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The ginger blood orange ceviche, made with fresh scallops, avocado, blood oranges, grapes, cilantro, red onion and fresh lime juice served with house tortilla chips is a tasty and different late night treat.

There are also several of the restaurant's popular sandwiches on the late night menu, including meatball, Italian beef, and pulled pork.

Trilla and Wingate said they are fortunate to have T.J. Borup on board as head chef.

"He is very experienced having worked in a variety of restaurants both here and in Minnesota and is very creative," Trilla said.

They're also glad to be part of the community.

"It is exciting to be part of the Lake Geneva business community and we look forward to helping the community in any way we can," Trilla said.

Flat Iron Tap is at 150 Center St., Lake Geneva. It's open at 11 a.m., Tuesday through Sunday, serving lunch and dinner. On Friday and Saturday from 9 to 11 p.m., the late-night menu is available.


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
